

ATTENDING AN ESTES AUCTION

Have you ever looked at the Antique Radio Classified magazine at those Estes Auction ads or read the write ups of the Estes Auctions with those rows and rows of antique radios and wondered, "What would it be like to actually experience one of these auctions?" I have.

Have you ever heard Rich Rodgers talk about how he grew up in the Estes Auction's back yard and how he would go to the action occasionally and pick a few radios for some paltry sum – just for something to do? I have.

Finally this year my curiosity grew to the point where it overshadowed my practical reasons for not attending one of these unique auctions. Besides the mundane practical reasons like time and money, my big one was that I can't drive eleven hours by myself without falling asleep. To solve this last big hurdle, I bribed my wife with a five-day vacation, one day of which I would spend at the auction. It worked! She loves vacations.

Getting there: We got to the auction site by heading north on I-75. At Cincinnati we veered to the right on to I-171. We exited I-171 at exit number 204. As we pulled off the highway we found we were in Burbank, Ohio, one of the two sites for the Estes Auctions and the one we were looking for.

Once in Burbank we thought it would not be too difficult to find the auction site, since I knew the name of the building and its address. The first few people we asked had no idea what we were talking about. We found this a bit peculiar because Burbank can't be more than four square blocks.

We did finally get directions to the site. It is on sort of an access road running parallel to the interstate highway we had just left. The parking lot was paved with grass and faced the barns of a neighboring horse farm. Being a hot day, especially for Ohio, you could not help noticing the horse barns, even if you were blind. The characteristic smell, you know. While standing in the parking lot my wife glanced across the highway and exclaimed, "YES, there is a God." There was a brand new shopping center on the other side of the highway. Guess where she spent her day? Well, she didn't buy any radios. Strange priorities!

The Preview: The auction was scheduled for Saturday. The auction items were previewed on Friday afternoon from 4:00 pm until 8:00 pm. The preview is a good idea because all radios are tagged with a batch number and an item number. The batch number represents the collection it came from and the item number is the item within that collector's batch. By writing down the batch and item numbers of the items you are interested in, it makes it easier to identify them during the auction. The auction moves very fast, so you best know which radios you are really interested in beforehand.

The radios are displayed on tables about waist high arranged in long rows with access aisles in between each row. The radios were somewhat grouped by category. The 1920's radios were in one area, the ham gear in another, and 1930's wood radios were mostly together in another. Consoles were in a separate floor standing area adjacent to the rows of tables.

The preview gave me my biggest shock. Since these were liquidations of collections of collectors who had assumedly been increasing the quality of their collections all their collecting career, I expected to see most of the radios in pristine, or at least excellent shape. Such was not the case. With the notable exception of three Atwater Kent breadboards which were like brand new, almost all the radios needed some work. Many of them needed a lot of work.

The Auction: The auction itself took place in one end of a very large auction building and close to the displayed radios. The auction was very well organized and moved along quickly. Richard Estes has a staff of about 8 people to handle the various tasks. Besides the auctioneer and sales recording person, there were 2 men hauling in radios from the tables to be bid on, one fellow selecting consoles to auction, and one man just to select tubes to sell. They would alternate between these groups so that there was never any dead time waiting for someone to bring an item to sell. There were no bathroom breaks or lunch breaks. The action went on until everything was sold. As the afternoon progressed the crowd dwindled. Richard Estes, obviously knowing this to be the pattern, auctioned off all the really good items in the first two hours or so of the event.

Although the bidding usually started off on each radio with several interested bidders, at the end it was almost always a battle between just two interested collectors. There was one conspicuous exception to this rule, however. There was one heavy gentleman who, if he wanted an item, would hold up his bidding number sign and leave it there until everyone else stopped bidding. It seemed to me that there was something inherently unfair about this, but I couldn't put me finger on it. I've got it! It was unfair if he were bidding against me.

Well, how about me? Did I enjoy it? Yes! Did I buy anything? Yes! I bought ten radios. If I had it to do all over again I probably would have bought five. (You will see the others at the winter swap meet.) I think next time I will bid only on a few radios I really want and leave the rest for others to enjoy. It is so easy to get caught up in the action and get carried away.

What did I buy? My favorites were an Emerson 212 "Bullet" with the pistachio trim lines, a 1920's Crosley 51 with tubes and original calibration documents, and a Zenith "cube". I also bought several tombstones of lesser nobility.

The big question then is "Would I do it again?" Does anyone want to share an eleven-hour drive to Ohio some time next year?


Radio Contest Announcement


